



Prescription Value Guide

How To Use This Guide*: This guide is designed to save you money by helping you and your doctor choose less expensive prescription drugs in the Prescription Advantage formulary when medically appropriate. This guide contains a listing of available brand name drugs on Level 2 (Preferred Drugs) grouped by therapeutic class, and listed alphabetically for your convenience.

Please note: Level 1 Generic Drugs and Level 3 Non-Preferred Drugs referenced in your approval letter are not included in this guide.

Steps You Can Take To Save Money: Be sure to bring the "Prescription Value Guide" to all of your doctor visits and talk to your doctor about your drugs. Your doctor can use the list as a reference when he/she needs to write you a prescription.

If your doctor prescribes a Level 3 Non-Preferred Drug (the highest co-payment), ask your doctor if a Level 2 Preferred Drug or a Level 1 Generic Drug is appropriate as an alternative. By referencing this guide, your doctor can determine whether a less expensive equivalent is available at Level 2. Often, doctors are able to choose from a number of drugs that are available to treat a particular medical condition.

If there is no therapeutically equivalent Level 2 or Level 1 drug available, you may be able to request that the Level 3 drug be provided to you at a Level 2 co-payment through Reconsideration. Approval of this particular Reconsideration requires that you meet income guidelines and that your doctor provide certain medical information to the plan.
